## Syllabus for U.S. Commercial Arbitration: Principles & Practice

<u>Course</u> <u>Description</u>	This course is an introduction to the law of U.S. commercial arbitration and practical skills necessary to effectively represent clients in arbitration proceedings. Through some traditional (and not so traditional) teaching methods, students will learn substantive law and practical written advocacy techniques and practice with real world problems. We will discuss arbitrations involving the sales of goods and services, construction, employment, consumers, securities, sports and entertainment. We will also discuss online and electronic assisted arbitrations.
<u>Course</u> <u>Meetings</u>	This class will meet on Wednesdays from 3:45-6:45pm in room TNH 3.124. Students will also be required to have one individual meeting with me after they have turned in their outlines for their final paper.
